Only good news!

Scientific knowledge is very new technologies advanced, benefit from a very favorable government policy, innovation subsidy programs are multiplying. We know that in the next few vears, thanks to the stratification of individual risk in breast cancer and knowledge in genomics, we will be able to intervene as early as prevention. Knowledge of our genetic code will make precision medicine accessible, predict the effectiveness of new treatments and offer the opportunity to minimize their side effects and provide insights into the chances of recurrence or metastasis.

We sincerely hope that these great advances augur the birth of a new era in health, an era that will see the concept of the patient at the heart of our concerns come to fruition and that will put forward the improvement of its quality of life at the same level as improving care and treatment. We hope that the promotion of patients' rights will enable them to play a proactive role in improving and maintaining their health and will enable them to make informed choices, adapted to their specificity, both in terms of genetics and in terms of individual values.

THE RIGHTS OF THE ILL

When the diagnosis is made and you start thinking about the different treatment options with your medical team, it's important to remember that you have rights and that your responsibility is to assert them by asking questions and participating. actively in decision-making. »

This is how the text on the Patients' Rights page of the Quebec Breast Cancer Foundation website (www.rubanrose.org/en) begins. We believe that everyone has the power to play an active role for their begins health, and has the duty to inform themselves, to know their rights as a patient and to enforce them. More specifically, patients have the right to be fully informed about their state of health and the therapeutic choices available to them, including clinical research, medical and therapeutic advances. They also have the right to participate in the decision making of the treatment to be received and to have access to quality services, as close as possible to their living environment, and within a reasonable time after the announcement of the diagnosis.

The Quebec Breast Cancer Foundation plays a vital role as an advocacy organization for people with breast cancer and their loved ones. We work closely with the medical teams in the various hospitals for various programs and we can discuss patient challenges. We understand the challenges of time and resources in hospitals everywhere in Quebec. In this respect, we are there to meet the special needs of patients when the system can not do it.

THE KNOWLEDGE

The Foundation also participates in empowering patients by giving them access to evidence-based information. We present and explain scientific advances and technological innovations in health in order to provide the opportunity for breast cancer patients and their families to participate actively in decisions about their health. To do this, we have incorporated many skills within the Foundation in recent years, to ensure that the information we disseminate reflects both the needs of patients and the opinions of medical professionals.

For the past three years, we have been organizing and presenting the Foundation's Annual Forum, which offers internationally renowned doctors, researchers and specialists the opportunity to pass on their knowledge of breast cancer to the general public through conferences and workshops. We take care each year to present the great scientific and social advances in breast cancer by popularizing science. In fact, we find that many professionals attend conferences alongside people with the disease and their families.

We are also part of different groups and committees that reflect on investment strategies in health and cancer, both in Quebec and in Canada. By being at the heart of the decision making, we stay informed and can make a real impact for patients. Our voice, together with those affected and their loved ones, counts. In this regard, the advent of patient partners is an important movement that also contributes to changing the nature of decisions made in the development of policies and programs offered by allowing them to be better adapted to the realities of patients.


PARTNERING PATIENTS

As examples of the implementation of programs that include patient communities in reflections and decisions: PAROLE-Onco, a program specifically deployed in a hospital setting, and one of the programs we develop within the Foundation, the metastatic breast cancer group, created this year thanks to our valued partners.

Dr. Marie-Pascale Pomey, a researcher at the CHUM Research Center, starting from the observation that breast cancer has significant consequences for women's lives, at the personal, professional and social levels, where they must quickly deal with a new reality and make crucial decisions for their health, developed the Patient Accompanying Project (PAROLE-Onco). This project, supported by the Quebec Breast Cancer Foundation, not only integrates support patients into care teams but also gives health care professionals a better understanding of the reality experienced by patients and needs that they feel, thus ensuring a better consideration of their needs in their interactions with patients.

The Quebec Breast Cancer Foundation metastatic breast cancer group was established following the observation that the needs of patients with metastatic breast cancer are different from those of early stage patients and require specific and better services. adapted that are not available to them at this moment. The Foundation has decided to conduct a needs assessment study through focus groups with patients with metastatic breast cancer to develop a list of priority needs and potential interventions. The Foundation hopes to improve the quality of life and overall well-being of this group of patients.

Empowering people with the disease and their loved ones to understand the disease and encourage them to participate in decisions related to their health is one of the priority responsibilities of the Quebec Breast Cancer Foundation. We are an ally in the services of patients and their loved ones, from prevention to recovery.

An inspiring journey

For members of the Foundation team who are lucky enough to know her, Mireille Fortier is a constant source of inspiration.

Diagnosed in 2014 with breast cancer, she contacted the Foundation in 2017 to offer a portion of the profits from her book sales to benefit our mission. We then discover an engaging woman, who has transformed her desire to understand her illness in order to help other women to take their health in hand.

More than just a testimonial, her book entitled « Cancer du sein: Accompagnement pas à pas pour mieux traverser l'épreuve » is a guide, humanly, completely and medically valid, for women who have just been diagnosed and their loved ones.

Mireille puts her own experience at their disposal and offers them practical and comprehensible tools to better approach the various stages of the treatment process, to give them a better understanding of the medical device and to make them masters of their history.

At the time of the release of her book in 2017, she learned that she had a second breast cancer. More optimistic than ever, Mireille confirms despite all her wish to be involved with the Foundation. Today, she is not only an active ambassador for the Quebec Breast Cancer Foundation, but she also offers people Tai Chi sessions, a discipline she learned during her first chemotherapy treatments, to maintain her vitality and avoid certain posttreatment effects.

Overcoming cancer is like having a second chance to live. It's a new beginning for many. In the case of Mireille, that changed everything.

I have always enjoyed life. Since I was young, I understood that life is precious. I would say that this ordeal reconciled me to my own life. I feel a lot of gratitude. I am less willing to please others for fear of being rejected or not being loved. I do not worry about being perfect anymore. I do things for myself. I do things for pleasure », she said in an interview. On a daily basis, Mireille teaches French to immigrants. Her generosity is matched only by her resilience. We are proud to count Mireille among our friends.





Use of Artificial Intelligence for the Discovery of Imaging Biomarker Evidence in the Diagnosis of Breast Cancer

- Dre Louise Provencher, CHU de Québec, and Imagia

Artificial intelligence (AI) is expected to play a crucial role in future efforts to detect and diagnose cancers. Indeed, the AI pushes the limit of the visible by detecting tissue abnormalities currently impossible to interpret by the human eye. One of the objectives of this project is **to correlate clinical data, mammary medical imaging and pathology** together to develop an algorithm to identify with greater accuracy images that correspond to a malignant tumor and to identify subtypes of breast cancer using the acuity of AI.

PERSPECTIVE Integration & Implementation

- Dr Jacques Simard, CHU de Québec

Identify genes that increase the risk of breast cancer to promote early detection.

Dr. Simard is head of the PERSPECTIVE I & I study (Personalised Risk Stratification for Prevention and Early Detection of Breast Cancer), which brings together 27 international researchers. This ambitious project aims to personalize breast cancer screening recommendations based on each woman's individual risk of developing breast cancer based on her genetic profile and lifestyle.

To perform this, researchers are mapping the DNA of cancer patients in search of genetic variations that increase the risk of developing the disease. Already over 200 variations have been identified and they have different impacts on cancer susceptibility. Some mutations are common in the population. It is the fact of having many of these mutations that increases the risk. Researchers want to develop precise algorithms to accurately predict the risks of developing cancer.

Thus, women more likely to develop the disease will begin breast cancer screening earlier in life. An early tumor requires less aggressive treatment, which causes fewer side effects and significantly increases the chances of recovery. A personalized screening program will help better detect breast cancers in younger women who are not included in the current recommendations.

The immunopetidome of breast cancer

- Dr. Claude Perreault, Institute for Research in Immunology and Cancer, Université de Montréal

Which proteins expressed by cancer cells are recognized by the immune system?

Dr. Claude Perreault is studying the immune system to find ways to make it more effective at recognizing and eliminating cancer cells. His discoveries:

A therapeutic vaccine

Dr. Perreault and his team have found antigens produced specifically by cancer cells that can be recognized by the immune system.

A peculiarity of their discovery is that proteins are produced by a portion of the DNA that seemed to be useless, the introns. The research focused on the coding parts of the DNA, the exons. This discovery opens the door to a tremendous amount of information to analyze in order to better understand the role of the introns, to elucidate new cellular mechanisms and to find new treatments.

Proteins produced by cancer cells can be therapeutically vaccinated. When cancerous antigens are injected into the body, the immune cells detect them and stimulate a recognition program. If they find these proteins on the surface of the cancer cells, they are ready to eliminate them.

The results obtained in the laboratory are promising and clinical studies should begin soon.

Study the immunopeptidome of breast cancer cells

In addition, Dr. Perreault examines proteins expressed by breast cancer cells to find specific antigens and prognostic biomarkers. His team found that genes involved in the breakdown of immune proteins are overexpressed in many cancers, including breast cancer. The presence of a large amount of these proteins is associated with better survival.

- Dr. Gaston Bernier, CHU de Québec

Seinbiose: a personalized breast prosthesis with a natural look

Women who have had a mastectomy try to regain their self-confidence by getting a breast prosthesis, but the options are unsatisfactory. Dr. Gaston Bernier and his Quebec team have designed an external breast prosthesis personalized and adapted to each woman. A 3D printer makes a prosthesis that fits perfectly with the curve of the chest and reproduces the exact volume of the breast while being more comfortable, light and flexible. More than 40 women have already been able to test and appreciate these prostheses. They were able to take advantage of this new technology and improve their self-esteem.



Brain Fog

- Dre Marika Audet-Lapointe, Hôpital Maisonneuve-Rosemont

Brain fog: managing a side effect of chemotherapy.

A disturbing side effect of chemotherapy is the appearance of cognitive difficulties, also called brain fog (chemobrain). This problem generates attention and learning disorders that can lead to difficulties in remembering.

The multidimensional intervention pilot project for women with breast cancer who have cognitive difficulties associated with oncology treatment is an initiative of Dr. Marika Audet-Lapointe of Maisonneuve-Rosemont Hospital to improve the management of this brain disorder.

The first step in dealing with this side effect is to be aware of it and recognize it. Guides and educational workshops have been developed to educate patients and their families about this potential problem and to suggest strategies to minimize it.

Tools have also been developed to help caregivers diagnose and minimize the harm caused by brain fog. For this purpose, a neuropsychological evaluation grid and a memory workshop have been developed.

This project aims to minimize the impact of chemotherapy on patients' lives and thus improve their quality of life.

Activ-Onco

- Dre Carmen Loiselle, Jewish General Hospital

Taking care of the bone health of women with breast cancer.

Some breast cancer treatments can weaken bones and increase the risk of osteoporosis and fractures. To improve the bone health of women treated for breast cancer, Dr. Carmen Loiselle and her team set up the Breast and Bone Health program.

Women should be made aware of the possible effects of the treatments on their bones and take care of their bone health. The Breast and Bone Health website contains a wealth of information and tips to prevent bone degradation: exercise plans, nutrition facts, lifestyle adaptations and a concrete plan of action for management.

Tools have also been developed for health professionals, such as scorecards, information leaflets and training. The Breast and Bone Health team has developed a clinical model that allows a nurse and physiotherapist to adequately intervene in the management of women treated for breast cancer at risk of bone degradation.

Breast and Bone Health promotes bone health and improves the quality of life for women.

The Centre ROSE and the Réseau ROSE (information and awareness centre and network)

Support and assist families at risk of hereditary breast cancer.

Mutations in certain genes are known to increase the risk of breast cancer. These variations are transmitted from generation to generation and can cause illness in many family members. Being a carrier of such genes generates anxiety and leads to important and difficult decisions to make.

The Centre ROSE (Oncogenetic Resources for Support and Education) was set up in 2012 by Dr. Michel Dorval and Dr. Jocelyne Chiquette to support at-risk families, offer them education and organize public lectures on topics related to hereditary breast cancer issues.

This center, complementary to the Deschênes-Fabia Breast Disease Center at the of the Hôpital du Saint-Sacrement of the University Hospital of Quebec, also works to develop models of clinical interventions and offer tools to health professionals to help management of hereditary breast cancer.

Extend the benefits of the Centre ROSE across Quebec

Given the positive impact created by the Centre ROSE, the center of support for families at risk of hereditary breast cancer, the founders decided to extend its reach by creating the Réseau ROSE. Since 2015, Centre ROSE satellites have been established in Montréal, Bas-St-Laurent and Saguenay to provide support in these regions. More families benefit from support and support to manage the risk of breast cancer.

Hers Mobile app

- Dre Susan Law, St-Mary's Hospital

A mobile application giving access to the experience of women who fought breast cancer.

To help get through breast cancer treatments, having access to as much information as possible is beneficial.

To help patients learn more about what lies ahead, Dr. Law and the Canadian Health Experiences Research Group have developed a mobile application containing the stories and experiences of cancer patients. These women recount their experiences, their choices, their decisions, their reflections on the various treatment options. These very personal stories accompany patients during their treatment by helping them find solutions to unexpected problems, make decisions about their health care, and better cope with the ordeal.

For more information Health Experiences The Foundation offers several support programs, including financial assistance and a telephone support line. We also develop new programs, one specifically for women with metastatic breast cancer and another for breast cancer survivors. The My Active Health program supports people with and at risk of developing breast cancer through several activities, of which we present two examples:

Yoga-Onco Sessions

Yoga oncology workshops allow women with the disease to benefit from free yoga classes for up to 2 years after the end of their treatments in a centre near them.

578 yoga sessions subsidized in 2018-2019!

100% of women would recommend the program and 97% will participate in yoga sessions again.

The Foundation is proud to subsidize new healthy lifestyle habits: for 41% of women, it was their first experience in yoga.

Buying pink


Simons



In 1994, with the disease having affected several family members, Pam McLernon decided to set up a voluntary organization made up of a group of women from a variety of backgrounds dedicated to the cause. Bold and courageous, these women laid the groundwork for a movement that would, 24 years later, invest more than \$ 50 million in research funding, education support.

- **5.** Volunteer participation.




